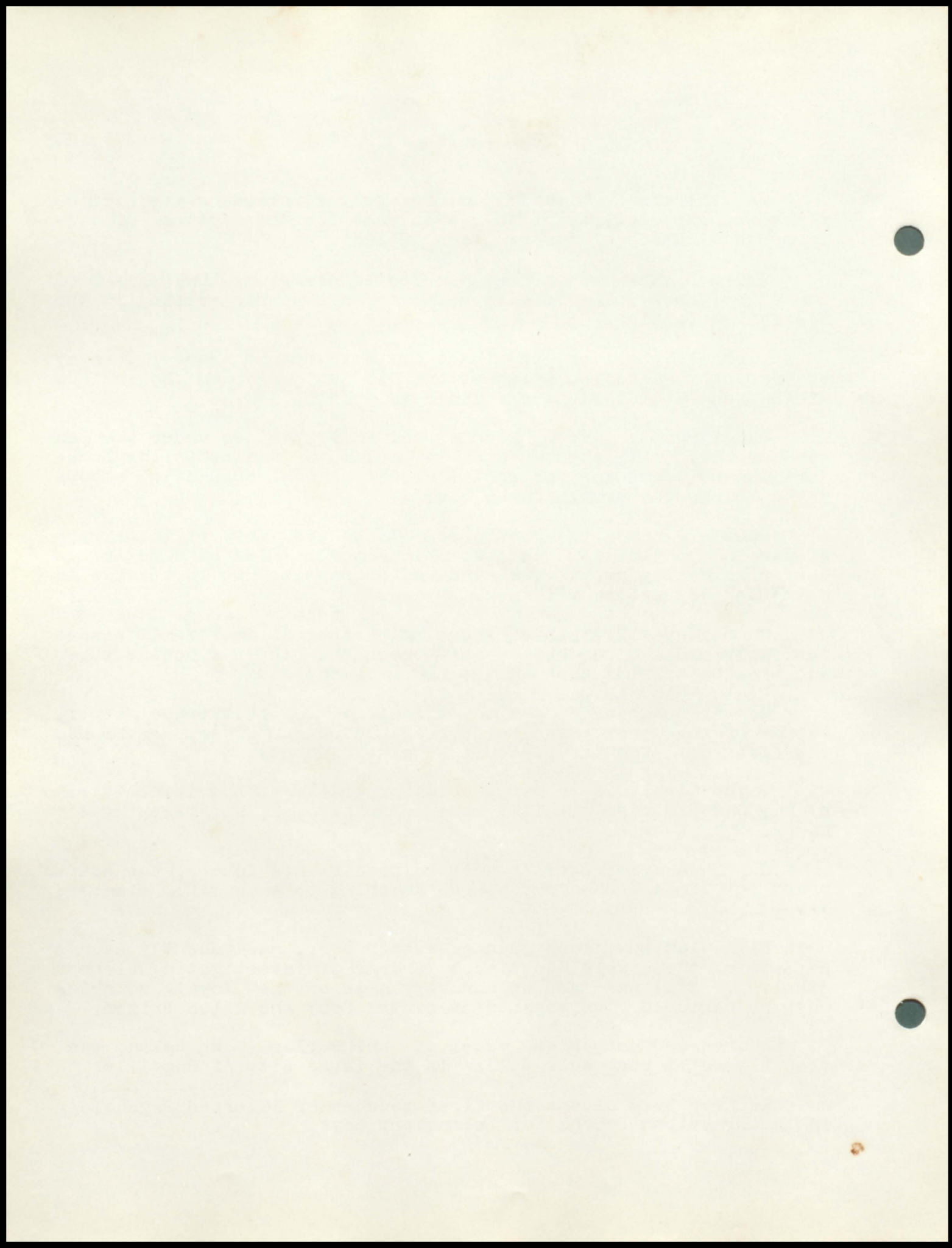
Joyce Nine, due to her phobia for wanting to be immaculately clean, has married a toilet soap manufacturer, and is extremely happy.

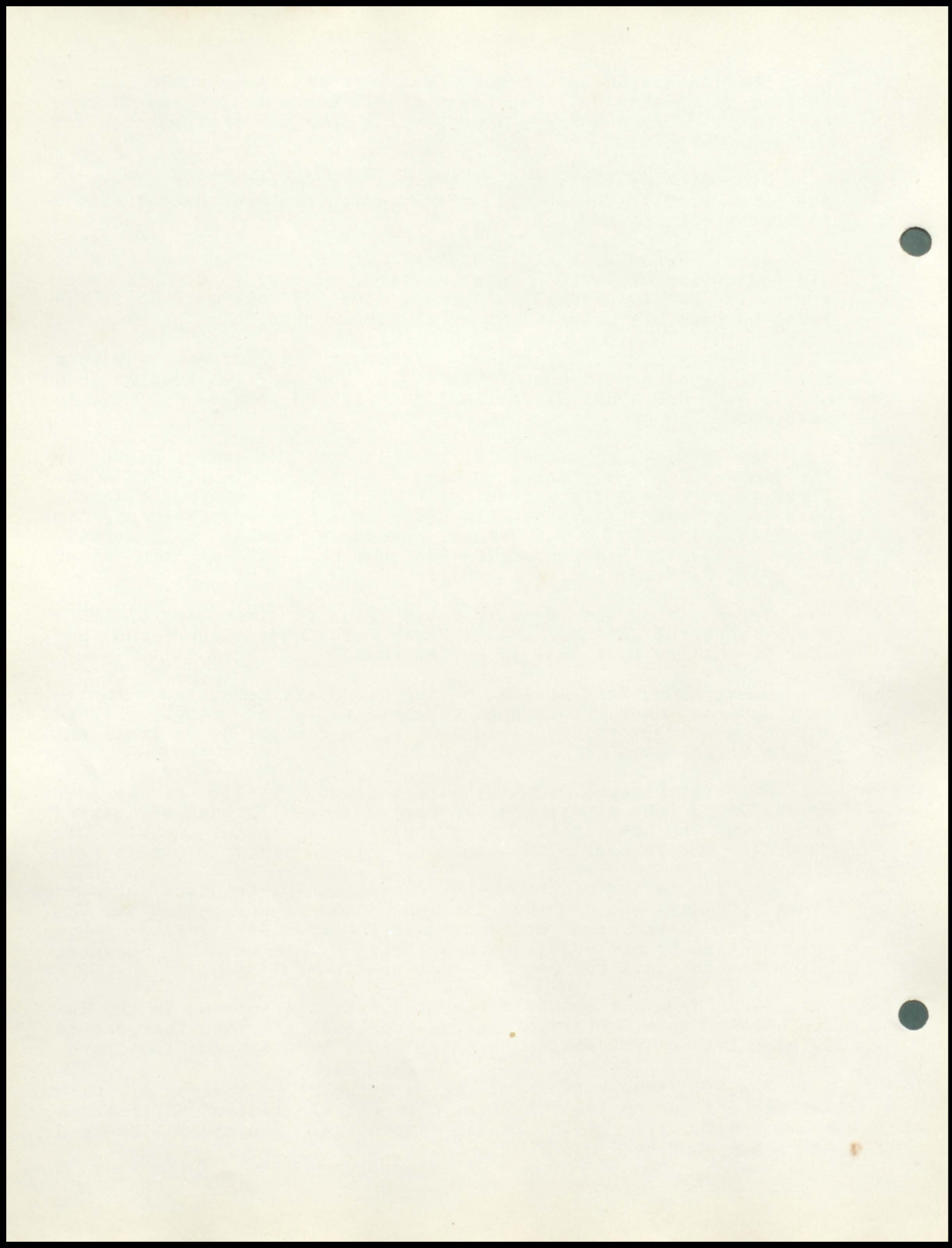

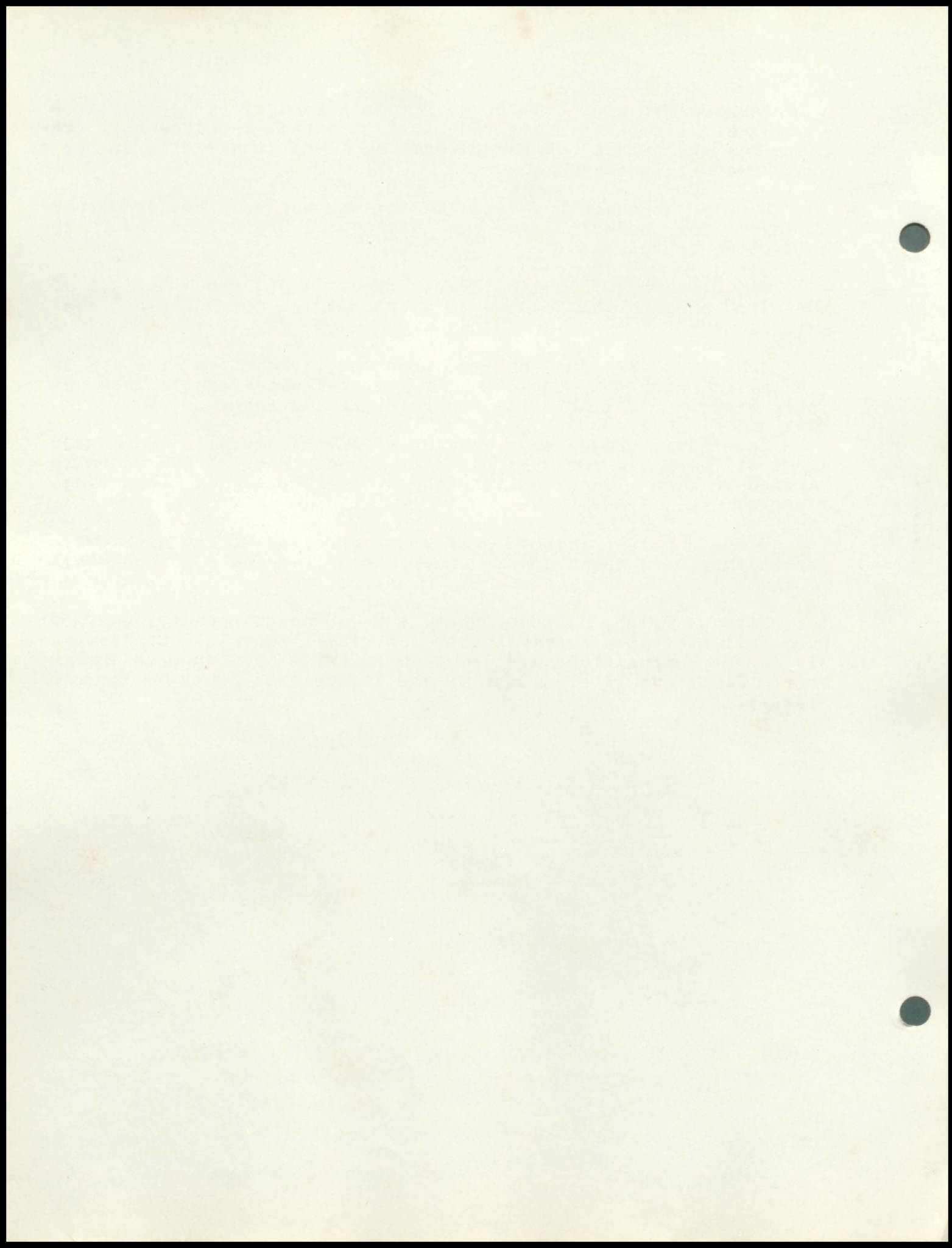

I looked quickly to see if Mr. S. was coming, and satisfied that he was not, I turned to the first page. This is what I read:

"Entry #1--April 23, 1940....Another class has finished its first year of learning--the class of 1951. There were forty-three six-year-olds who started this year: Delores Jean Bell, Barbara Brown, Betty Lou Droke, Ruth Lavon Droke, Harriet Eppert, Marcia Fobes, Rosemary Gingerich, Sasha Ann Hire, Kathryn Huey, Katherine Kistler, Margaret Kitson, Patricia Koher, Marilyn Godshalk, Sharon LeCount, Mavle Rarig, Marilyn Russell, Marie Stiver, Joy Stuckman, Janis Weimer, Carlyle Baumgartner, Jim Blocker, Arlen Bobeck, Jon Bushong, Jack Darr, Paul Disher, Darrell Grisamer, Richard Kitson, John Kroh, Stephen Lung, Gareth Meek, Raymond Oyler, Ernest Rogers, Charles Reagan, Robert Sheire, Emory Stiffler, Delbert Strieby, Robert Gene Whitmer, Duane Devault, Richard Allan Hann, Oskar Holderman, Karl Hoover, Mary Maxine Snooks and Jackie Devault.

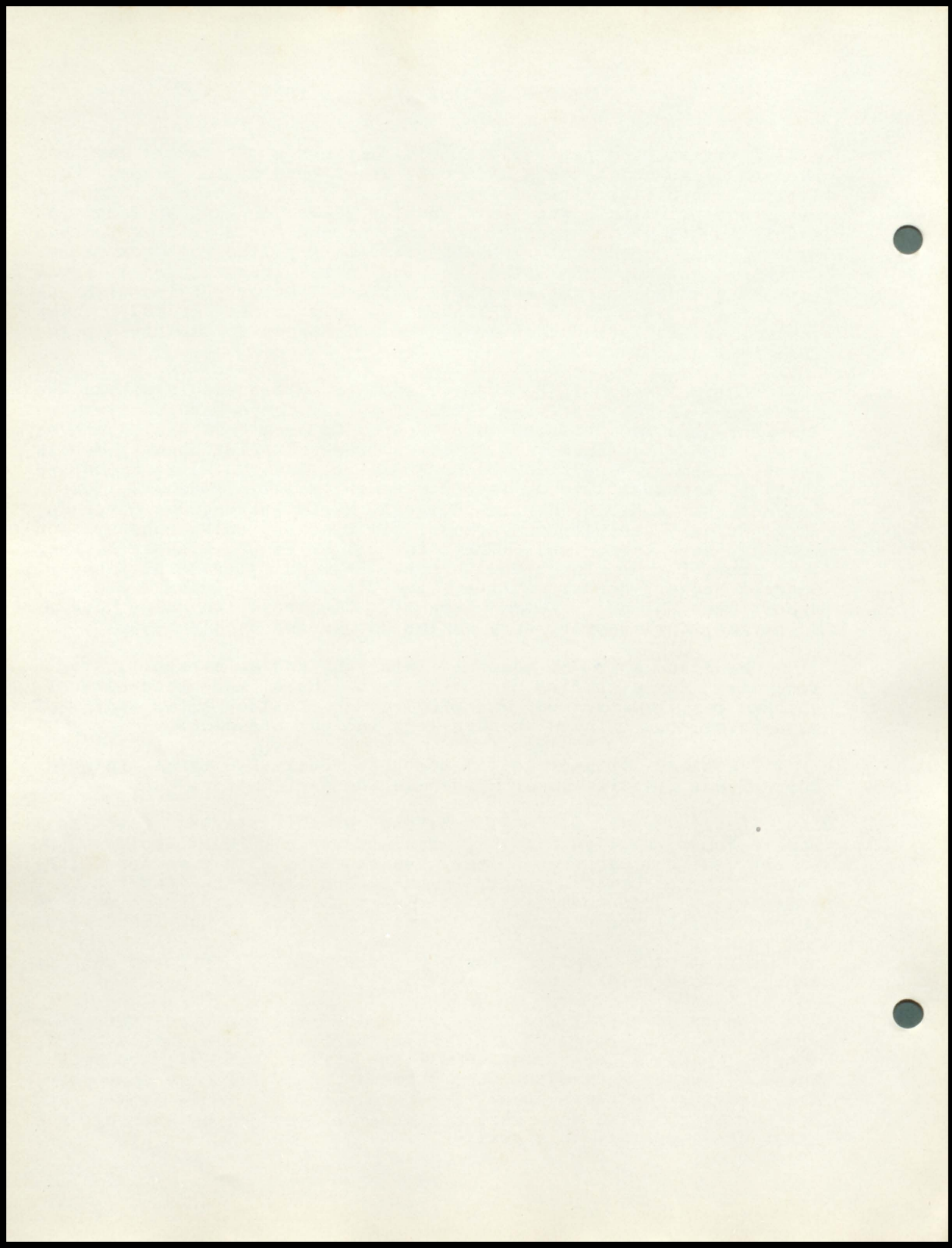
There was a lot of absence this year and as a result, grades went down for a grading period or two. There were epidemics of chicken pox, mumps, and whooping cough besides a few cases of pneumonia, sore throats, broken legs and car accidents.

The class already lost 5 members: Betty Lou Droke, Kathryn Huey, Duane Devault, Oskar Holderman and Karl Hoover."

"Entry #2--May 9, 1941....Before school started last fall Marcia Fobes, Marilyn Russell, Paul Disher, Delbert Strieby, and Robert Gene Whitman dropped out. New students this year were: Jack Dean and Lyman Lawson. Later Lyman Lawson left and Kathryn Huey came back to join the class. At the end of the year there were 35 energetic children working hard toward the goal of the third grade.

During one grading period there were 24 children out of school with measles."

"Entry #3--April 27, 1942...Welcomed into the class this year were: Janet Fangmeyer, Billie Draker, Carroll Walton, Donald Smith, Charles Unger, Robert Dean, Charlotte Miller and Richard Nolan. However, Janet Fangmeyer, and Charles Unger left the same year. Also leaving the class were: Delores Jean Bell, Janis Weimer, and Richard Hann. Miss Mary Ross did an excellent job of keeping this class under control this year."



"Entry #4--April 16, 1943....This year our young students are under the leadership of Mrs. Gants. Ruth Lavon Droke, Carlyle Baumgartner, Jack Devault and Billie Draker left the companionship of their schoolmates. Jean Ann Lung, Alice Saper, Lee Henry and Ronald Strieby came and left in the same year. These others also came this year: Frank Kranz, Ronald Price, David Williams, Richard Hann, and Joyce Nine.

"Entry #5--April 24, 1944...Coming into the class were Harold Stabler, Jerry Kearney, Marjorie Wagner and Audrey Hamman. Leaving the class were Barbara Brown, Jack Dean, Carroll Walton, Robert Dean, Frank Kranz, and Lyman Lawson. James Sawyer entered and withdrew in the fifth grade.

"Entry #6--April 27, 1945....A ball team began to take shape this year. John Kroh, Steve Lung, Jack Darr, Ernie Rogers, Garry Meek and Arlen Bobeck constituted this team. Mr. Cook has prophesied that these boys will be the next team to be a tournament winner. They play together well so it would not be surprising.

Our new ones this year were Juanita Stahley, Shirley Koher, Jimmy Ritter, Virginia Ringler, Doris Sawyer, Bobbie Johnson, Jerry Kearney and Marjorie Wagner were the only ones to leave the class this year.

"Entry #7--April 23, 1946..The list of new students contained Mary McDonald, Barbara Brown, Marjorie Wagner, Alma Strieby, Tom Gilbert and Arnold Grindle. Rosa Smith, Delores Evans, Boyd Kerr, Mary Cox came and left in this year. This class lost Mary Maxine Snooks, Audrey Hamman, Shirley Koher, and Patricia Koher.

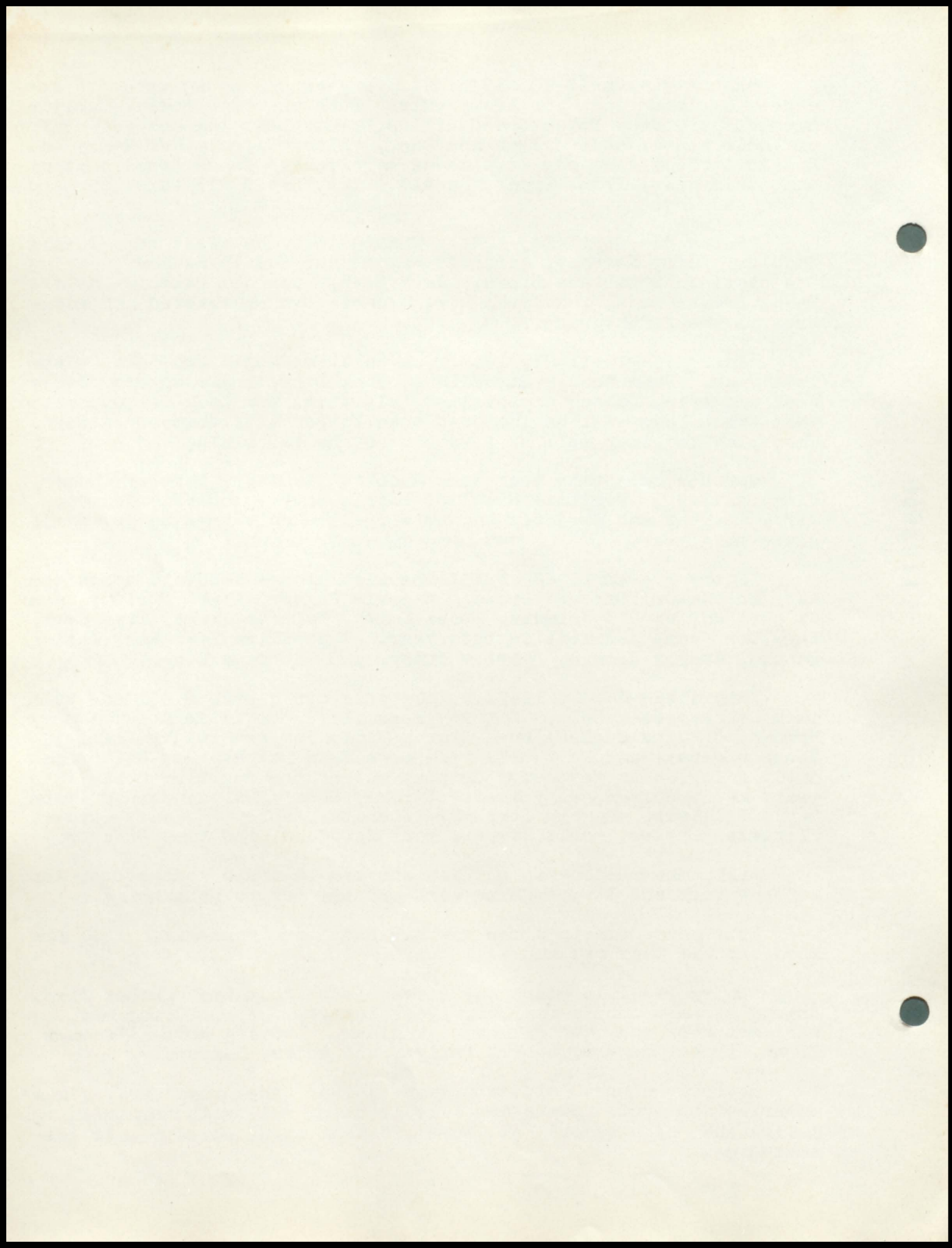
"Entry #8--May 2, 1947....This year our class of '51 has with them Delores Jean Bell, Shirley Becknall, Ann Marie Meek, Audrey Hamman, Richard Hughes, Alfred Place, James Fry and Dwight Stahley. Those who came and left this year were John Bright, Guy Weaver and David Eiler. A large number dropped out of the register books this year: Marie Stiver, Mary Maxine Snooks, Donald Smith, Ronald Price, David Williams, Harold Stabler, Juanita Stahley, Jimmie Ritter, Virginia Ringler, Doris Sawyer, Mary McDonald, and Alma Strieby.

Well, the hunting spirit has started in these youngsters, too. Arlen Bobeck and Stephen Lung were out one day to go hunting.

Next year starts a new career and I am wondering into how much trouble they can and will get.

"Entry #9--This year the class lost four and gained five. Coming in were Sondra Sigrist, Jack Dupree, Sharon Cotherman, Margaret Robinson, and William Gladieux. Leaving were Barbara Brown, Ernest Rogers, Robert Sheire, and Audrey Hamman.

Several of the students have joined the boys' and girls' courses and band. Sasha Ann Hire is doing well with her twirling. I like the high school attitude of this class already. It has amazed me.



"Entry #10--May 27, 1949....Ten left the class, three came in and one came and left in the same year. Lost were Harriet Eppert, Mable Rarig, Emory Stiffler, Shirley Becknal, Richard Hughes, Albert Place, Dwight Stahley, Sondra Sigrist, Jack Dupree, Sharon Cotherman. Joining the class were Doris Hoover, Beverly Sink (the new coach's daughter), and Bob Sheire. Francis Moore came and left this year.

Parents and teachers (and drivers) have a few more worries this year. Several of our sophmores have become sixteen and evertone knows what that means. Stephen Lung, Jack Darr, Bill Gladieux, and Gareth Meek now have Drivers' licenses.

Mr. Cook's prophecy of the sixth grade came true and the team defeated Warsaw in the final game of the Sectional Tourney.

"Entry #11....The next to the last year of school with the class play, in which Sasha Hire, Bill Gladieux, Billie Kitson, and Jack Darr played the leading roles, Junior-Senior Prom, ballgames and selling candy, etc. Already they are beginning to worry about what they will do with their excess money at the end of next year.

Leaving the class were Jean Bell, Richard Hann, Marjorie Wagner, Tom Gilbert, Ann Marie Meek, and Doris Hoover. Nadena Coy came this year but did not stay very long. Dick Kitson, who had been ill for many years but was still studying with the class, passed away this year to the sorrow of his classmates. Dick was a fine student and everyone liked him.

"Entry 12--May, 1951...The last of the twelve years is nearly through and this year the class only lost two: Bob Sheire and Katherine Kistler. Barbara Brown come back this year and Janet Fenstermacher is the only new student.

Activities this year included the class play, pictures being taken, ballgames and tourneys, work on the annual, Senior girls entertained by the Wednesday Afternoon Club, the Junior-Senior get-together in the spring, and finally---graduation.

There were sixteen of the class who went through all twelve years together. They were Rosemary Gingerich, Sasha Hire, Margaret "Billie" Kitson, Marilyn Godshalk, Sharon LeCount, Joy Stuckman, Jim Blocker, Arlen Bobeck, Jon Bushong, Jack Darr, Darrell Grisamer, John Droh, Steve Lung, Garry Meek, Raymond Oyler, and Charles Reagan.

It's been a wonderful year for them and though "parting is such sweet sorrow", surely the class of 1951 will agree that it's been good to be together.

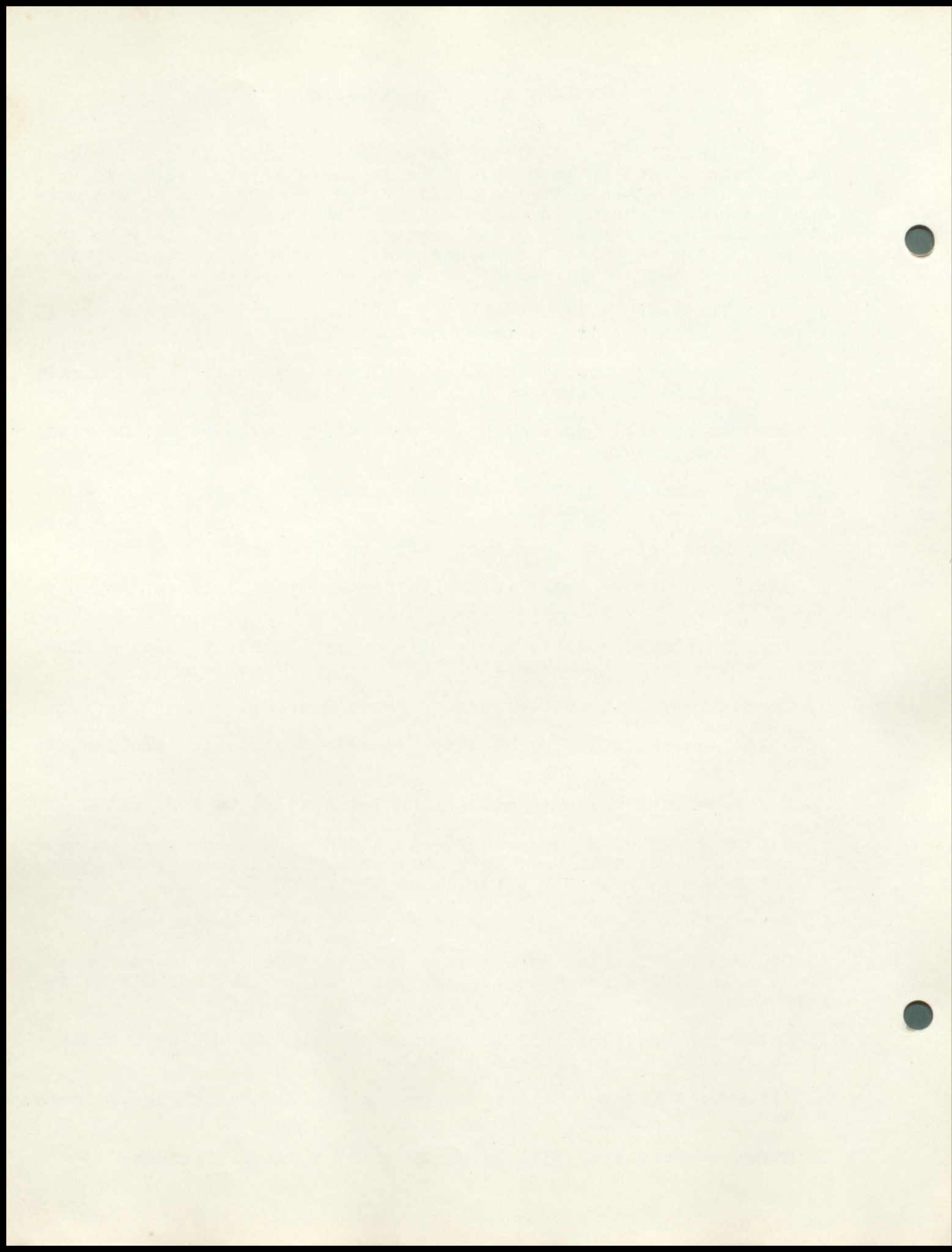
I, Sharon LeCount, will my "pepsi bounce" to Shirley Disher.

I, James Blocker, will my ability to play the cornet to Clifford Kistler.

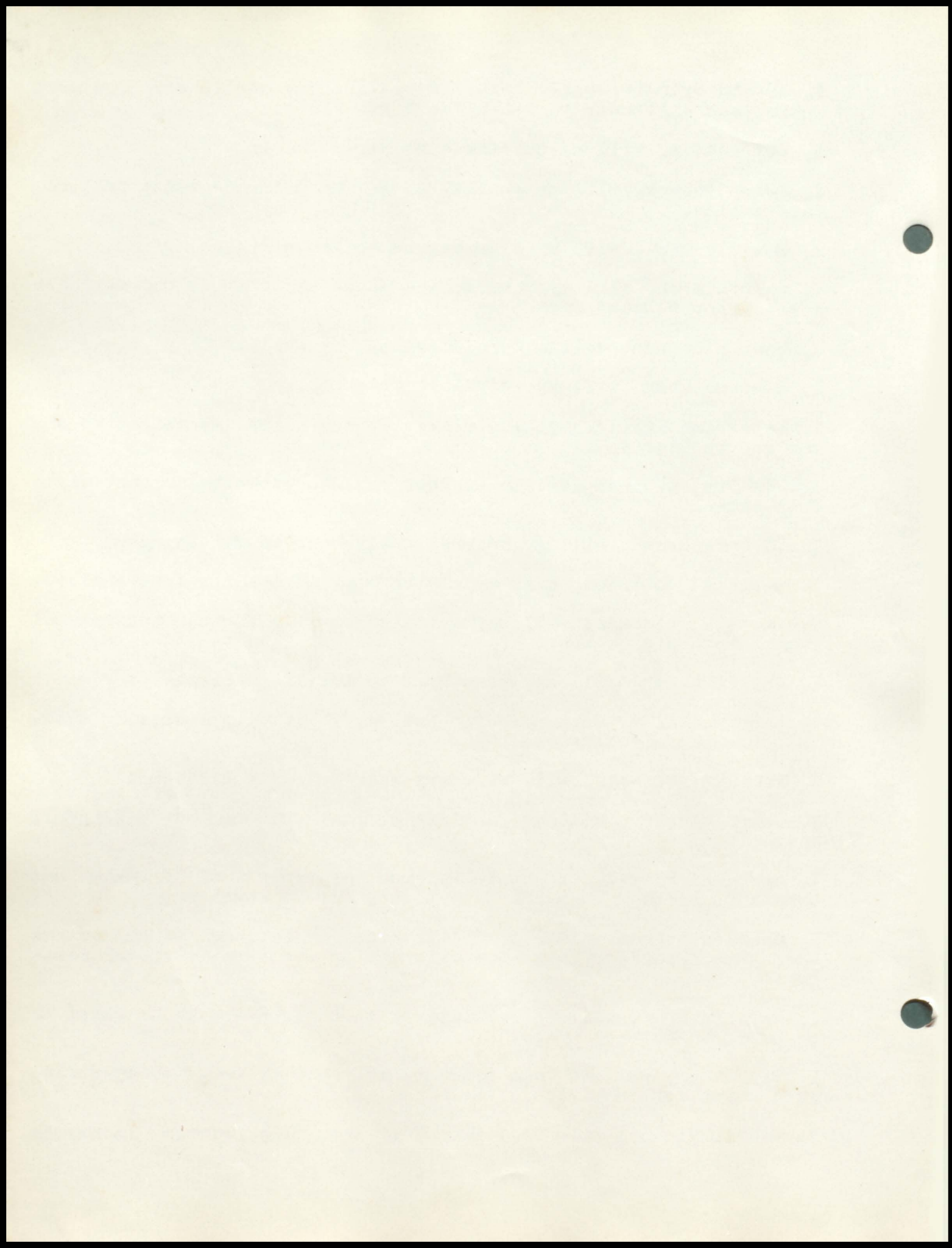
I, Sasha Hire, will to Louie Dyland, my record of "Frankie and Johnnie" so that he won't have to beg for it anymore.
