As we started our sophomore year Barbara Hart, Myrna Miller, Mabel Rarig, Wilfred Miller, Jack DeVault, Claire Mock, Shirley Reed, and Marilyn Ringler were missing from our ranks. Joel Bates and Emory Stiffler joined us and Dina Mench returned after spending a year at a girls prep school in Ohio.

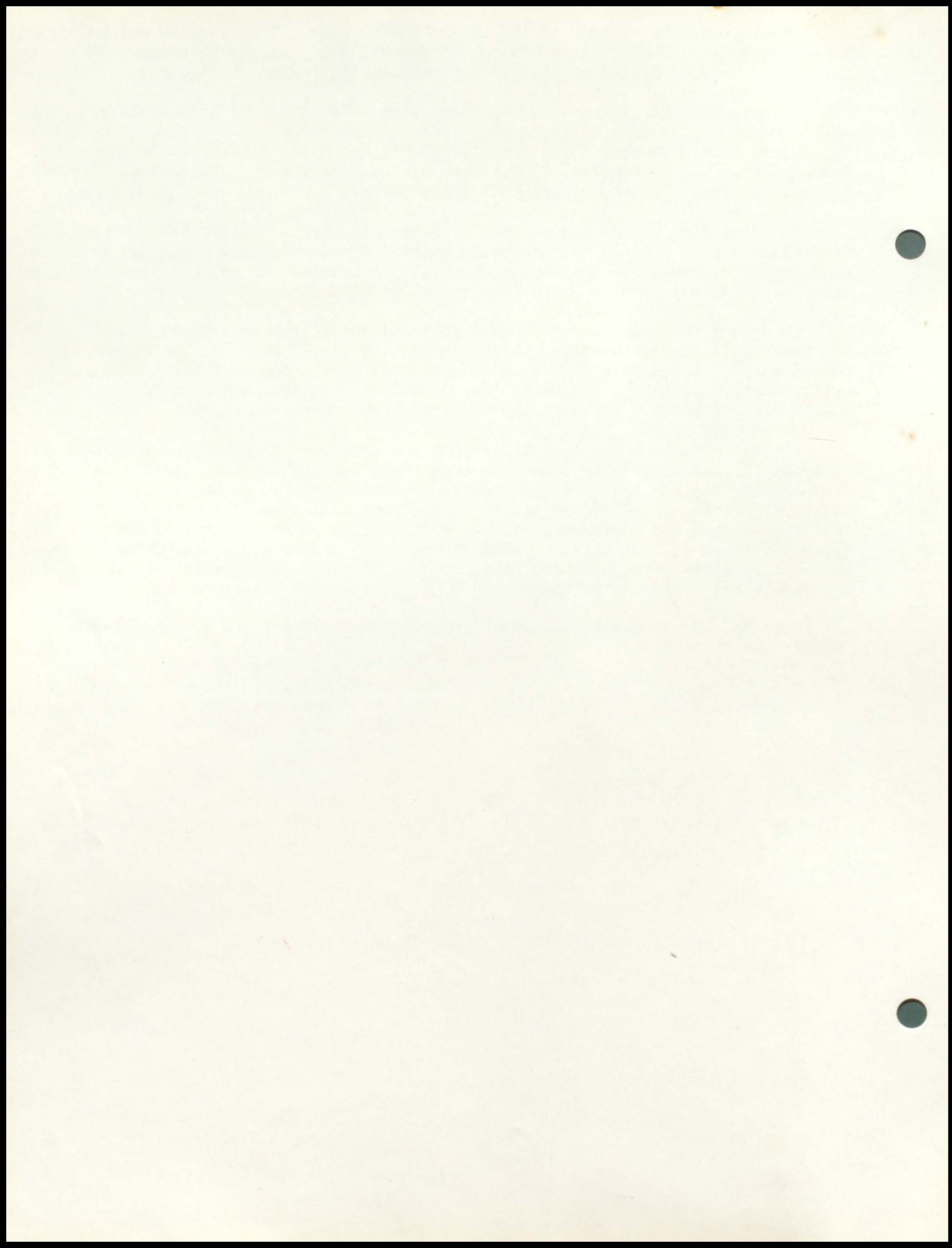

## NORMA STABLER

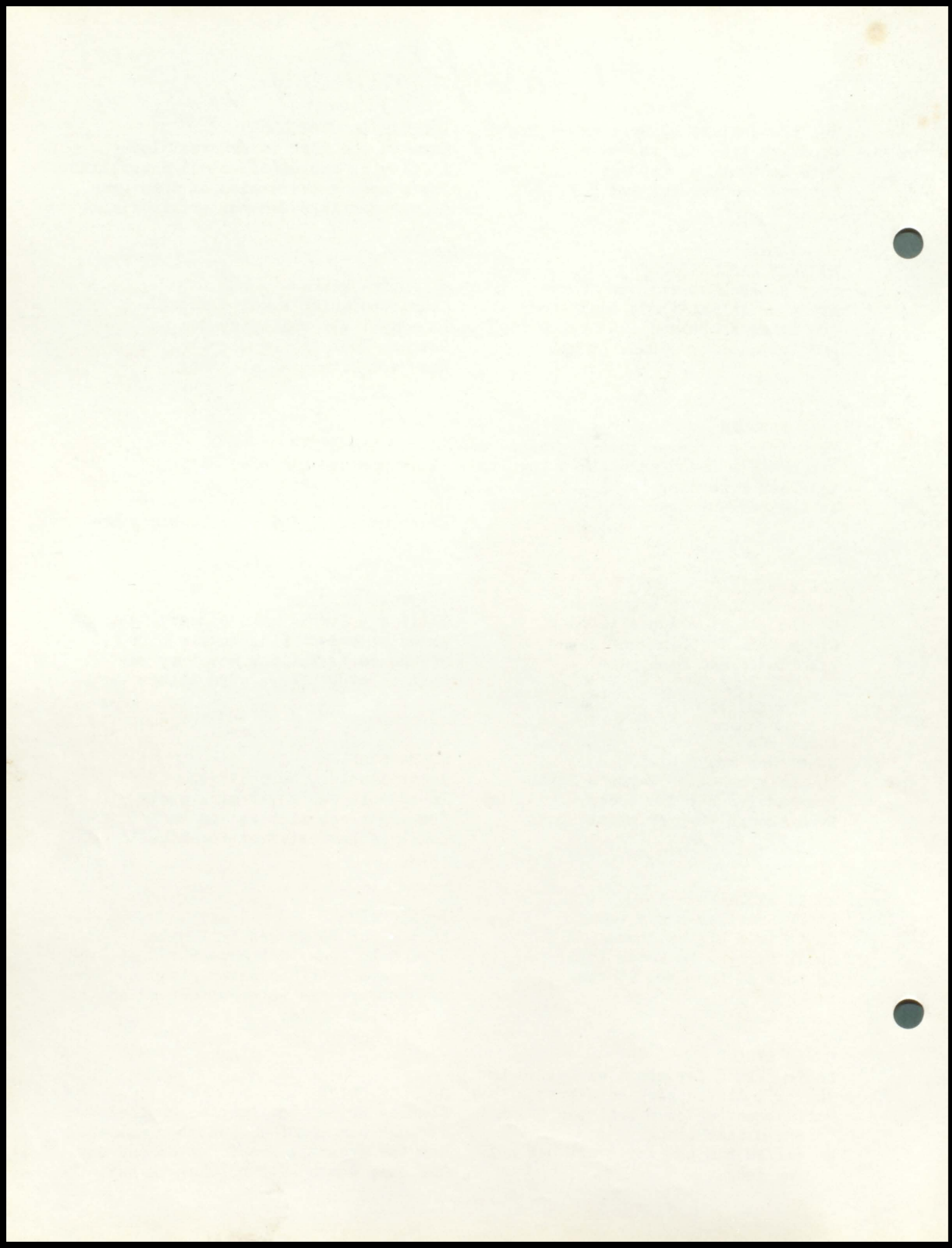
Norma Stabler, we could say

She'll be the last to let you down.

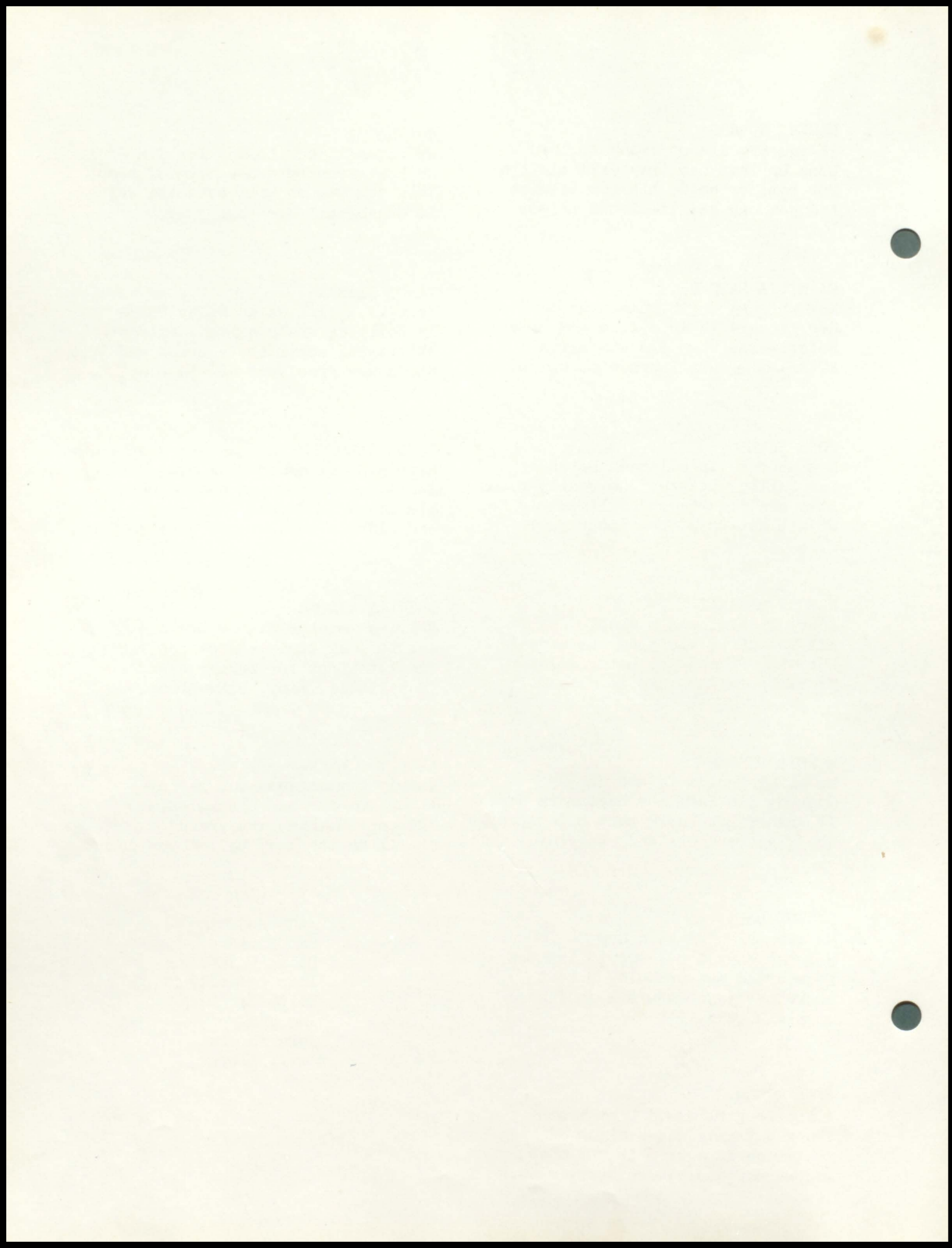

I, Nancy Beamer, will my ability to keep quiet in the study hall to Jenny Morgan.

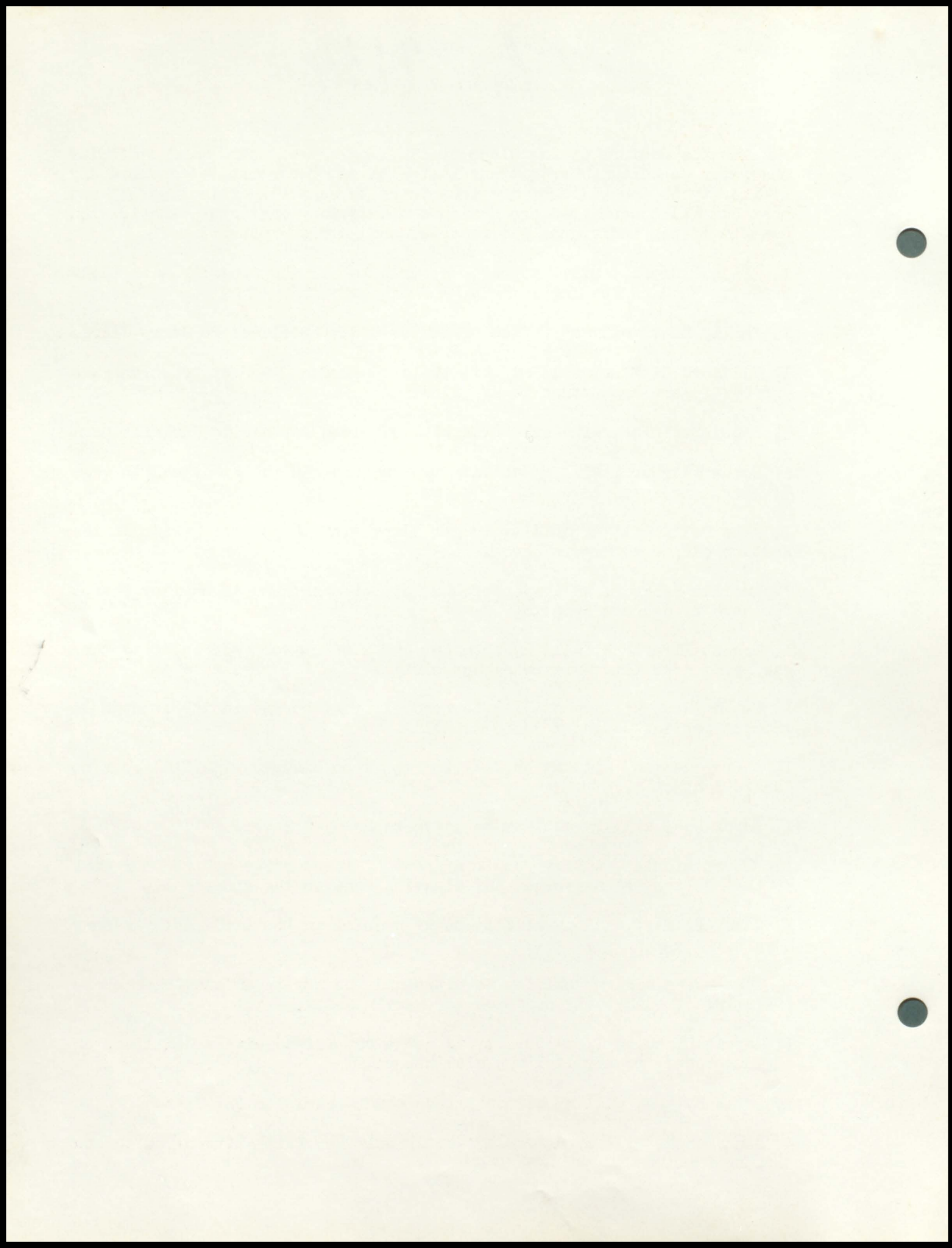
I, Tom Roose, will my ability to withstand the strain of Coach Sink's officiating at basketball practice to Marvin Shock.

## *Basketball*

The 1951-52 Yellow Jackets lacked height but made up for it with speed and scrappy, clever ball handling. They started off the season by playing Milford on the home floor. Their first five games proved to be losses. Then they won over Millersburg, 63-55. The Yellow Jackets then played the Catholic Seminary, New Paris, North Webster and a second game with Milford, losing 3 out of the 4 by close margins. The Jackets then went on to win a thriller over Claypool in a double overtime. Syracuse proceeded on a three game losing streak before coming up against a much favored South Whitley team and in one of the best games of the year the Yellow Jackets downed South Whitley to add another win to the books.

In the Sectional Tourney Syracuse easily defeated Mentone, 69-41, in the first game. Columbia City followed and downed the Yellow Jackets, the latter going on to the finals. Thus ended the playing season for the 1951-52 team. The Syracuse Varsity loses three players this year: Pete Doll, Joel Bates, and Tom Roose. Season record was 4 wins against seventeen losses.





## SIDELIGHTS OF THE YELLOWJACKETS

Arnold "Pete" Doll--Pete's ability to drive and to score mid-way down the floor gave him the position of guard on the first five. Pete was high point man for the Jackets with an average of  $12\frac{1}{2}$  points per game. He is five feet-nine inches tall and a Senior. This is his third year on the varsity.

Joel Bates--Although he is only five feet-ten inches tall, he played the position of pivot man for the Yellow Jackets. He showed great ability in rebounding on both the offensive and defensive backboards. Joel is a Senior and this is his second year on the varsity.

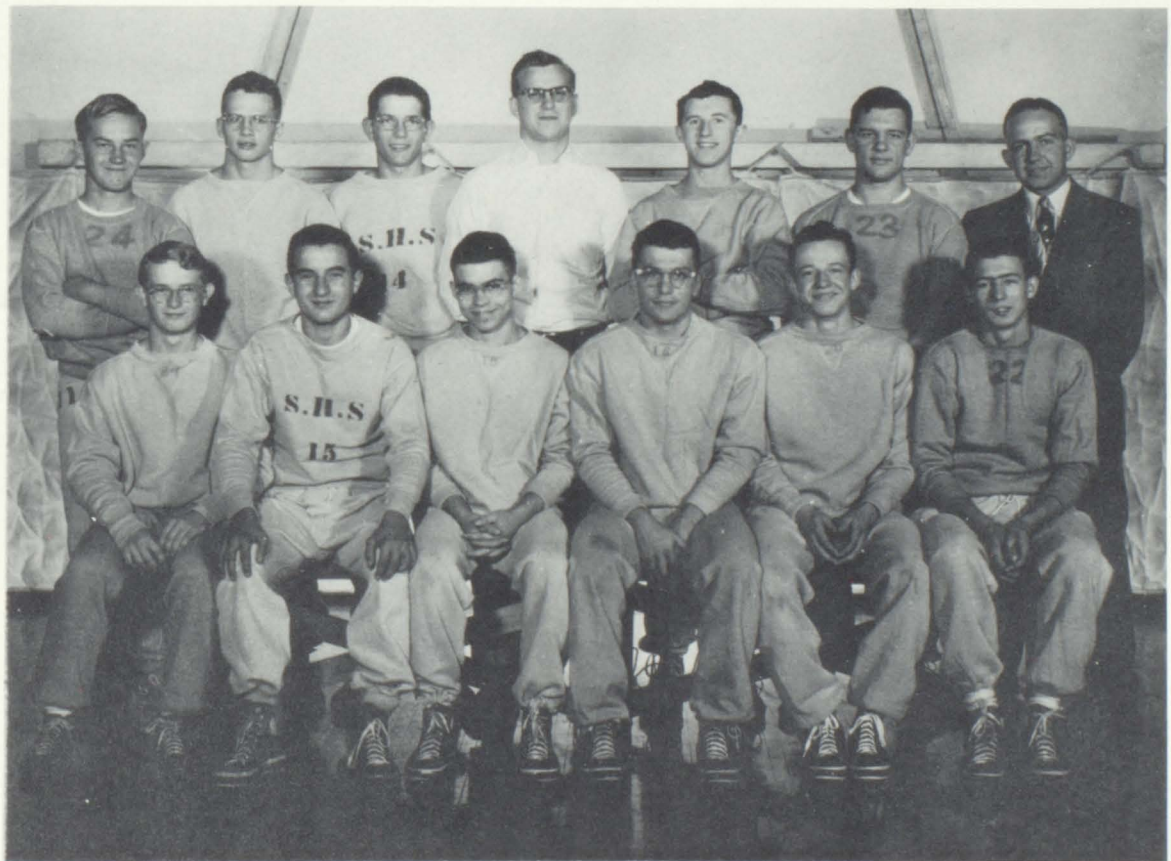


# Track

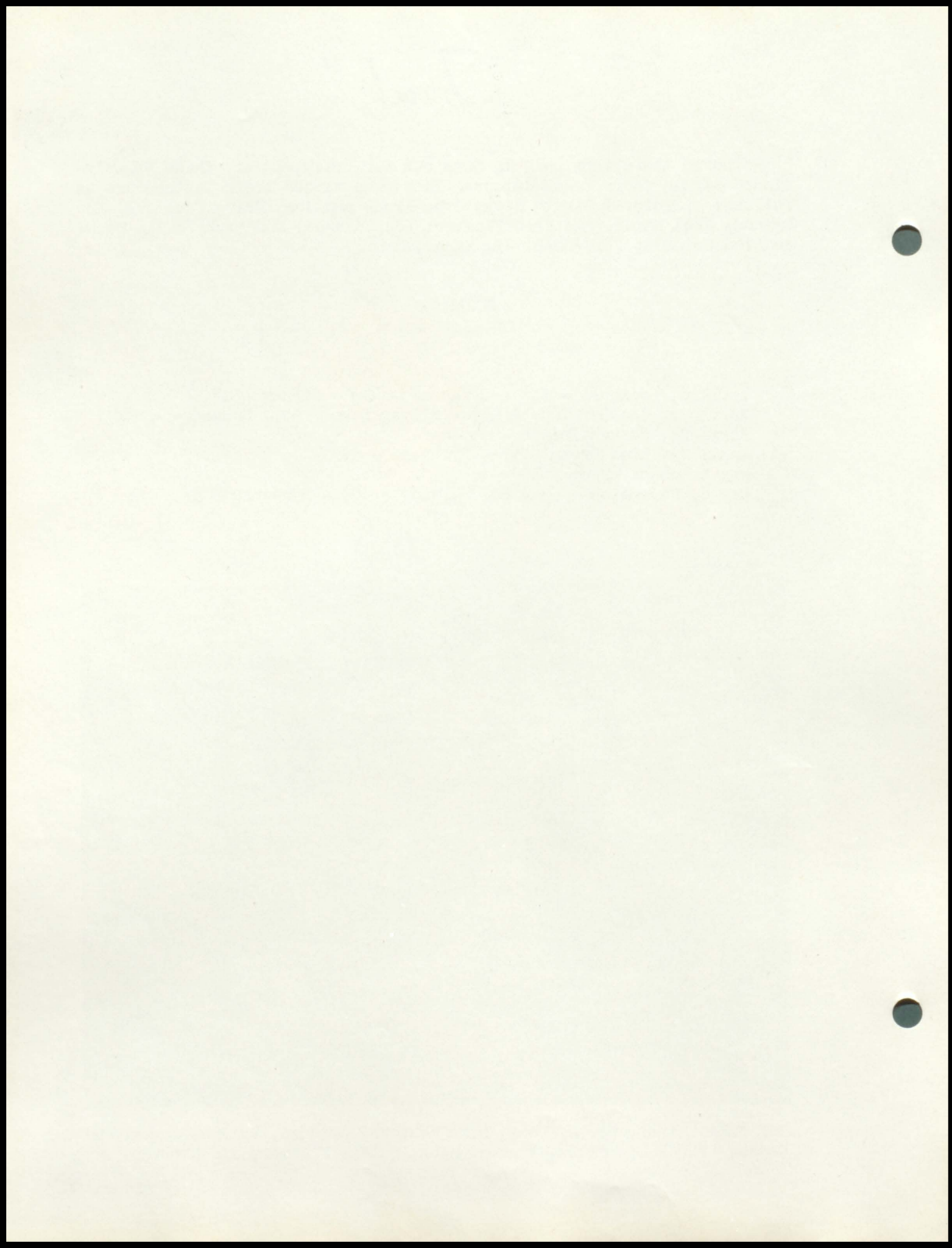

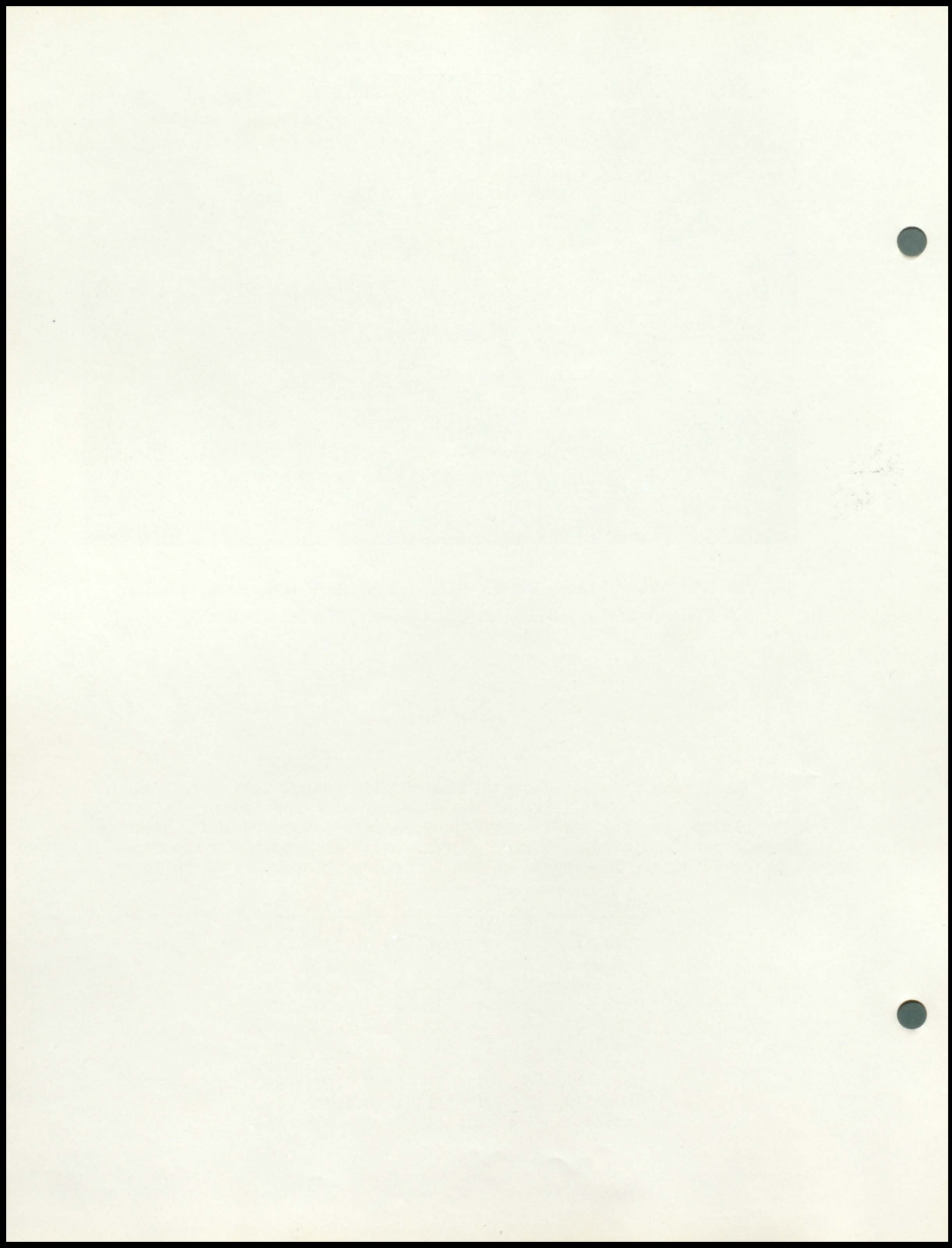

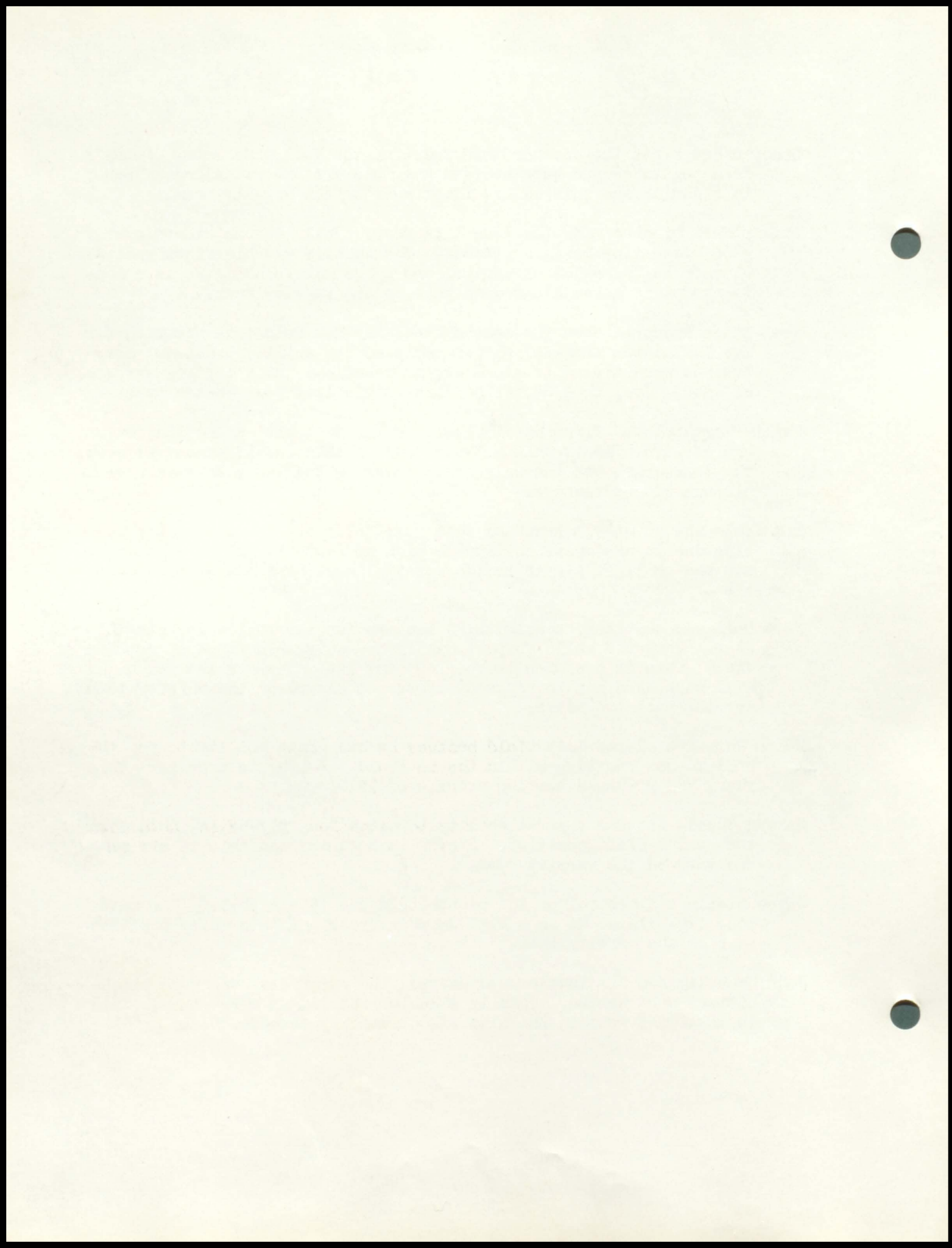
Keith Herbison played left field because he has great ability to peg the ball to any position within the in-field. Keith is a Junior this year, and he has a batting average of .210.
